


All children took part in the Walk of Fame in February. This involved trying to increase the number of active journeys to school and recording it online. We finished 11th in Essex overall and 92nd in the UK – an excellent achievement. In particular, many children

used the Asda Park and Stride facility which counts as an active journey (and helps minimize traffic outside of school). Our School Council even measured the distance from school to Asda (827 steps if you're interested).

Our children also submitted hundreds of entries to the National Design competition for the next set of WOW badges. We have our fingers crossed that we are successful!

Chelmsford Museum Visit, Year 5

Year 5 were invited to spend a day exploring Chelmsford Museum in order to help them learn more about Marconi and his contribution to the world of wireless communication (as part of a wider project around the Titanic disaster). The staff at the museum provided workshops about radio technology and Marconi's life, which has helped the children with their English work about biographies. The children were also able to take some time to explore the museum independently and learn even more about a range of topics about their local area. The staff were incredibly complimentary of the children's attitudes and behaviour and it was a pleasure to see the children learning in such an enthusiastic and welcoming environment.

Then to Chelmsford Community Radio at Moulsham Mill where they contribute each Sunday to the programming with a slot they create in their school radio club called 'Back to Backnang'. It was then onto Chelmsford Museum and of course to Chelmsford City Centre and to London for a bit of retail and sightseeing! We also had a combined Anglo – German bowling trip one evening to Braintree.

It was great to see some different faces around school and students in Year 11 and in the 6th form enjoyed meeting them. Many of them now plan to stay in touch and feel they have made friends to keep! We are looking forward to going over to Backnang in July for our part of the reciprocal visit.



Mock Bar Ipswich – Regional Competition

On Saturday 28th January the Mock Bar team descended on Ipswich Crown Court for the Regional Mock Bar Competition. We arrived



prepped to prosecute and defend our cases that students have been prepping for weeks. The students all performed amazingly well, with the jury ruling in our favour with every case. This demonstrated that the students argued their cases to convince those on the jury from other schools. The students received excellent feedback from the Judges. One described the level as exceptional and our barristers were better than many that had been in her courtroom. Our Court Clerk and Usher were also described as exceptional. The final Judge said that if he shut his eyes, our students sounded like his trainee barrister pupils. It was a great day for all involved – a huge congratulations to all students on the team.



Art Solutions

All of the schools in the Colchester Consortium took part in a joint art day this week. The theme was 'Journeys' in order to raise awareness for Refugee Action. A number of schools in Colchester are hosting Ukrainian and Afghan refugees and working very closely alongside this fantastic charity. The finished pieces of art will be displayed in a 'gallery' setting later in the year.

At Lakelands, we chose to represent this theme through animal migration; we learnt about reasons why animals would migrate such as the need to search for food and shelter. We invited the amazing Art Solutions to come in and host some workshops with our children and we are so proud of the end results. Not only do we have an incredible piece of art to represent journeys, but we have some beautiful end results that represent the Lakelands estate for display in our school.



Football Festival

On what probably seemed like the coldest day of the year, some of our pupils went to a Football Festival as organised by the Colchester and Blackwater School Sports Partnership at Northern Gateway.

The pupils took part in a few skills based games, which ended with a mini 5 a side tournament against other schools.

We are so fortunate to be able to take part in the sports festivals; we have a few more planned over the course of the year.



Music at Lakelands

We have been so fortunate to work with Essex Music Service this half term. Our music teacher has been working hard with the school choir as we will be performing in the Colchester School's Music Festival, alongside other schools next week. As it is the 70th Music Festival, our pupils will be singing songs from each decade since the 50s, including *Waterloo*, *Eye of the Tiger* and *Sing*. We cannot wait to perform in front of a live audience at such a big show for the first time.



We have also had enrichment sessions in our Reception classes, where children explored changing tempo and moving in different ways to respond to the music. Children used a variety of instruments such as shakers, rhythm sticks and glockenspiels.

Design and Technology

In Design and Technology, pupils have been learning about healthy foods including a balanced diet and the different food groups. First they tested different sugary drinks, deciding how much sugar each one had and which one had the most and least. We were amazed by how much sugar a can of Coca Cola had in it!



Then, children taste tested some food combinations to help them decide what they would like to include in a healthy wrap. They were given the instruction that they must include a carbohydrate, a source of protein and vegetables. They used our specialist STEM room, where they enjoyed chopping their ingredients, folding their wraps and most importantly, eating their delicious creations. To finish, children evaluated their

wrap and wrote their own instructions to allow other people to create their recipe.

Oracy Week

During the week of 6th March, the whole school took part in 'Oracy Week'. This involved all of our subject areas planning a specific oracy task for a targeted year group which took place during a lesson; so that all students could take part.

At RVHS, we really want to drive the importance of speaking confidently so that our students feel prepared for situations later on in life that require higher level speaking skills. It was also a great opportunity for students to express themselves in an alternative way and receive feedback from their teachers on this skill.

An example of one of the tasks that students engaged with was a debate in Religious Studies called- 'Is it ever a good idea to tell a lie?' This controversial question allowed students to delve into some philosophical thinking and our Year 7s certainly expressed their opinions on this topic clearly! We also encouraged our students to discuss using the 'Ouch and Oops rule' Please see the table below:

Options Evening

On Tuesday 7th February, we held our Year 9 Pathways Evening. All students in Year 9 and their parents were invited onto school site to meet subject teachers, discuss GCSE options and listen to a GCSE Pathway talk with our Options Team.

It was great to see how excited our students were to talk to subject teachers about subjects that they have the opportunity to study at KS4. Subjects such as Sociology, Media, Business Studies and Sports Studies have not previously been studied in Years 7-9, so our Year 9s were particularly keen to find out more about their curriculum and topics.

Each student is allocated a 'Pathway to Success' based on our progress data. These pathways are tailored for our students to ensure that they are given the best possible opportunity to succeed whilst at RVHS. Our Year 9s will begin studying their choices at the end of the Summer Term, so that when they start in Year 10 they have had a 'flying start' to their GCSE courses.


