Thank you to all the pupils who have been keeping in touch with their class teachers. Please remember to ask children to do this once a week. It can be a message about work or other things they have been doing at home and need not be long at all.

For the unusual times in which we find ourselves, maintaining regular email contact is the key way for teachers to

uphold their ongoing, legal safeguarding responsibility. If teachers cannot get in touch with parents or pupils, it raises concerns which will be recorded and escalated appropriately, including in some circumstances to external services.

Please help us avoid getting to this point by emailing each week.

I am excited to read book 4 and see what happens next!


I am also reading the series of football books called Ultimate Football Heroes, they are easy reads and great if you enjoy football like me. I have read Van Dijk and Paul Pogba.
